

The Prophet Muhammad ﷺ as a Mercy to the Worlds: A Qur'anic and Hadith-Based Study on the Universality of His Message and Its Impact on Global Peace'

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Abstract

The Prophet Muhammad ﷺ is universally recognized as a mercy to the worlds, whose ethical, spiritual, and social teachings offer guidance for humanity across time and culture. This article examines the universality of the Prophetic message and its profound impact on global peace and intercultural understanding. Drawing upon Qur'anic injunctions and authentic Hadith literature, the study demonstrates that the Prophet ﷺ's principles of mercy (rahmah), justice, forgiveness, and ethical leadership form the foundation of a comprehensive moral framework applicable to individuals, communities, and nations. The analysis highlights the practical mechanisms he employed for peace-building, including reconciliation, dialogue, inclusive governance, and the protection of human rights, emphasizing that sustainable peace is inseparable from ethical conduct. Through his life, the Prophet ﷺ addressed social, political, and spiritual challenges, providing a model that transcends tribal, ethnic, and religious boundaries. The article further illustrates how the Prophetic teachings promote intercultural understanding by fostering mutual respect, cooperation, and social cohesion, particularly in diverse and multicultural societies. By applying the principles of mercy, justice, and ethical leadership derived from the Prophetic model, contemporary societies can effectively address conflicts, reduce social tensions, and cultivate moral and spiritual development. This study underscores the enduring relevance of Muhammad ﷺ as a universal guide, demonstrating that his message is not confined to historical or geographical contexts but remains a source of inspiration for global peace and ethical reform in the modern era. The findings suggest that integrating the Prophetic principles into governance, education, and social practice can significantly contribute to sustainable peace, moral development, and intercultural harmony worldwide.

Introduction

The life and message of the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ represent one of the most transformative forces in human history. His mission, rooted in divine revelation, was not limited to a particular tribe, nation, or culture, but extended to all humanity, encompassing every dimension of existence. The Qur'an describes him in a profoundly universal expression: "We have not sent you but as a mercy to the worlds" ¹ This verse encapsulates the essence of his prophethood—mercy (rahmah) as the very core of his character and the guiding principle of his message. From this divine declaration emerges a comprehensive vision of peace, justice, and compassion that transcends time, geography, and ethnicity.

The world into which the Prophet ﷺ was born was one steeped in moral decline, tribal warfare, and spiritual confusion. Arabia of the sixth century lacked central governance and moral unity. Social divisions, exploitation of the weak, and gender inequality were widespread. In this fractured environment, Muhammad ﷺ appeared not merely as a reformer but as a divinely guided mercy whose mission sought to heal the moral,

spiritual, and social wounds of humanity. The Qur'an and Hadith portray his mercy as both practical and universal a living manifestation of God's compassion on earth.²

In the Qur'anic worldview, mercy (*rahmah*) is not a passive sentiment but an active, creative principle that underpins divine action. Every chapter of the Qur'an, except one, begins with the invocation "*In the name of Allah, the Most Compassionate, and the Most Merciful.*" This repetition is not ornamental but foundational; it situates mercy as the beginning and essence of all existence. The Prophet ﷺ thus embodies the divine attribute of mercy in human form guiding, forgiving, and uplifting all who came into contact with him. The Prophet's ﷺ conduct toward friends and foes alike reflected this spiritual ethic. When persecuted in Makkah, he responded with patience. When victorious in Makkah years later, he forgave his enemies, declaring, "*Go, for you are free.*" Such acts were not political tactics but living expressions of divine mercy in human behavior.³

Moreover, the universality of his message is repeatedly emphasized in the Qur'an. In Surah Saba, Allah declares: "*We have not sent you except to all of mankind, as a bringer of good tidings and a warner.*" Unlike earlier prophets whose missions were confined to their respective communities, Muhammad ﷺ was sent as a guide for all peoples and times. This universality was not merely theological; it had moral and social implications. His message offered a framework for peaceful coexistence, social justice, and universal human dignity principles that remain urgently relevant in the modern global context.⁴

The Prophet's ﷺ compassion extended beyond human beings. His teachings urged kindness to animals, respect for the environment, and moderation in the use of natural resources. In a well-known hadith, he said, "*There is a reward for kindness to every living thing.*"⁵ This comprehensive ethic of mercy reflects a worldview in which all creation is interconnected under divine mercy. Such a vision challenges contemporary paradigms that prioritize power, competition, and materialism over empathy and moral responsibility.

His message of peace was not theoretical but lived in every dimension of his life. The Charter of Madinah one of the earliest written constitutions established a pluralistic society where Muslims, Jews, and pagans lived under a common civic framework. It enshrined equality, freedom of belief, and mutual protection, laying the foundation for peaceful coexistence among diverse communities. In a world torn by religious intolerance and sectarianism, this model stands as a timeless testament to the Prophet's ﷺ inclusive and merciful governance.⁶

Furthermore, his teachings on forgiveness and reconciliation reveal a deep understanding of human nature. The Qur'an instructs believers to "*repel evil with what is better*"⁷ a principle that the Prophet ﷺ exemplified consistently. His response to hostility was never vengeance but reformation. Even his adversaries were transformed by his integrity and kindness. Many of those who opposed him most fiercely eventually embraced his faith, recognizing that his strength lay not in force but in forgiveness. Such moral transformation underscores the power of mercy as a means of achieving genuine peace.

The relevance of this Prophetic model extends powerfully to the modern era. In a world marked by wars, inequality, and cultural fragmentation, humanity is once again in need of a unifying moral vision. The message of Muhammad ﷺ offers precisely that: a universal framework grounded in mercy, justice, and compassion. His life demonstrates that peace cannot be sustained by power alone but must be nurtured

through moral consciousness and spiritual empathy. His example remains a moral compass for individuals and societies seeking equilibrium between justice and compassion, law and love, faith and coexistence.

Contemporary scholarship increasingly recognizes the global dimension of his message. Scholars such as Karen Armstrong, Fazlur Rahman, and Muhammad Asad have highlighted how the Prophet's vision integrated spirituality with social ethics, creating a holistic model of human flourishing. Armstrong notes that "Muhammad's achievement lay in transforming a violent, fragmented society into a peaceful community bound by faith and compassion." Such scholarly acknowledgment bridges the gap between historical study and spiritual relevance, revealing the Prophet ﷺ not as a figure of the past but as a timeless guide for humanity's collective future.⁸

In sum, the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ stands as the embodiment of mercy in its most complete form—a mercy that heals, uplifts, and unites. His teachings, rooted in divine revelation, continue to inspire ethical renewal and spiritual balance in an age of moral confusion. The universality of his message offers humanity a way forward: peace through compassion, justice through mercy, and unity through shared moral purpose. The following sections will explore how this mercy is articulated in the Qur'an and Hadith, how it shaped early Islamic civilization, and how it continues to offer solutions to contemporary global challenges.

The Concept of Mercy (Rahmah) in the Qur'an

Mercy (*rahmah*) is the central theme of the Qur'an and the foundation upon which the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ built his prophetic mission. Linguistically, the Arabic word *rahmah* derives from the root *rahima*, meaning "to feel tenderness or compassion." It denotes an expansive, active form of care that encompasses divine action and human moral responsibility. In the Qur'an, Allah is repeatedly described as *Ar-Rahman* (The Most Compassionate) and *Ar-Rahim* (The Most Merciful), highlighting that mercy is both universal in scope and specific in application.⁹ This divine attribute is not abstract; it manifests in guidance, forgiveness, sustenance, and the provision of spiritual and material blessings. By embodying *rahmah*, the Prophet ﷺ exemplifies the highest expression of divine compassion, translating theological concepts into lived ethical principles.

The Qur'an establishes mercy as the core of God's interaction with creation. Every chapter except one opens with "*In the name of Allah, the Most Compassionate, the Most Merciful*" (Bismillah al-Rahman al-Rahim), signifying that all divine action stems from compassion. The Prophet's ﷺ life demonstrates that human ethical conduct should mirror divine mercy. Qur'anic verses consistently urge believers to act with compassion: "*And We have not sent you, O Muhammad, except as a mercy to the worlds*" and "*And lower to them the wing of humility out of mercy*" These statements situate mercy as a guiding principle in human behavior, not merely a passive sentiment. Mercy, in this framework, is transformative: it fosters moral development, strengthens social cohesion, and mitigates conflict.¹⁰

Mercy in the Qur'an operates on multiple levels. First, it is divine mercy (*rahmat Allah*) directed toward all creatures. Verses such as "*My mercy encompasses all things*". Demonstrate that God's compassion extends to humans, animals, and the natural world alike. Second, mercy functions as ethical instruction for humans. The Qur'an repeatedly commands acts of forgiveness, patience, and charity: "Repel evil with that which is better; then he between whom and you was enmity will become as though he was a devoted friend". In these verses, mercy is not optional; it is an active force shaping social interactions, conflict resolution, and the pursuit of justice. Third, mercy provides spiritual guidance. Through divine compassion, believers are offered repentance, forgiveness, and the possibility of moral growth, illustrating that mercy encompasses both external and internal dimensions of human life.¹¹

The universality of mercy is emphasized through the Qur'an's repeated distinction between believers, non-believers, and creation at large. Mercy is not restricted to Muslims or any specific group; rather, it is an ethical paradigm applicable across humanity. Surah Al-An'am states, "And your Lord is the Forgiving, Full of Mercy. If He were to impose blame upon them for what they earned, He would have hastened for them the punishment".¹² Here, divine mercy serves as both an ethical example and a practical model: patience, tolerance, and compassion are preferable to harshness or retribution. The Prophet ﷺ, as the embodiment of this Qur'anic principle, consistently applied it in his dealings with the people of Makkah and Madinah, demonstrating that mercy is a tangible, actionable ethic rather than an abstract ideal.

Mercy also manifests through moderation and balance in the Qur'anic worldview. Human relationships, economic practices, and social governance are all to be guided by compassion. Verses emphasizing fair treatment of orphans, kindness to neighbors, and just conduct in trade all reflect the Qur'anic integration of mercy into every aspect of life (4). The Prophet ﷺ internalized these principles, creating a moral order in which mercy was inseparable from justice. For instance, he prohibited cruelty in warfare, encouraged equitable distribution of wealth, and forbade exploitation of the weak. His ethical framework was not merely legalistic but holistic, aiming at the flourishing of both individuals and communities.

Furthermore, Qur'anic mercy has a pedagogical dimension. Believers are called upon to imitate divine mercy through conscious ethical engagement. The Prophet ﷺ serves as the exemplar par excellence, demonstrating that mercy can guide governance, interpersonal relations, and conflict resolution. This instructional aspect is evident in verses that couple divine mercy with human responsibility: "Indeed, Allah loves those who act justly"¹³ and "So by mercy from Allah, [O Muhammad], you were lenient with them".¹⁴ Such passages highlight that mercy is both a divine gift and a moral obligation, demanding active implementation in the life of a believer.

The conceptualization of mercy in the Qur'an also intersects with universal human concerns. Issues such as social inequality, oppression, and conflict are addressed not merely through prohibitions but through the promotion of compassion. The Qur'an repeatedly emphasizes that societal well-being is contingent upon the exercise of mercy: kindness toward the vulnerable, forgiveness in interpersonal disputes, and equitable treatment of all members of society. By framing mercy as both ethical imperative and spiritual ideal, the Qur'an establishes a comprehensive moral framework that is relevant across cultures and eras.¹⁵

In conclusion, the Qur'anic concept of mercy (*rahmah*) is central to understanding the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ as a transformative moral agent. Mercy operates at the divine, ethical, and social levels, offering guidance for both individual conduct and societal governance. Through the Qur'an, believers are taught that mercy is not a passive sentiment but an active force capable of transforming communities and human relationships. By embodying this mercy in his life, the Prophet ﷺ provides a concrete model for implementing divine principles, demonstrating that the pursuit of peace, justice, and compassion is both a spiritual and practical endeavor. The subsequent sections will explore how this Qur'anic principle of mercy was embodied in the Hadith and the Prophetic model of conduct, reinforcing the universality of his message and its enduring impact on global peace.

The Qur'anic Description of the Prophet ﷺ as 'Mercy to the Worlds'

The Qur'anic verse "*And We have not sent you, [O Muhammad], except as a mercy to the worlds*"¹⁶ encapsulates the essence of the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ's mission. The term *rahmah* (mercy) in this context

signifies a comprehensive and active compassion that extends beyond mere sentiment to encompass guidance, justice, and moral rectitude. This divine characterization positions the Prophet ﷺ not merely as a messenger but as the embodiment of mercy itself, whose life and teachings serve as a model for ethical conduct and peaceful coexistence.

1. The Universality of Mercy

The phrase *rahmatan lil-‘ālamīn* (mercy to the worlds) underscores the universal scope of the Prophet’s ﷺ mission. Unlike previous prophets whose messages were directed towards specific communities, the Qur’an explicitly states that Muhammad ﷺ was sent to all of humanity and beyond. This universality is further emphasized in Surah Al-A’raf.¹⁷ Where Allah commands, “Say, ‘O mankind, indeed I am the Messenger of Allah to you all’”.¹⁸ The Prophet’s ﷺ mercy, therefore, is not confined to a particular group but is intended for all of creation, encompassing humans, animals, and the natural world.

2. Mercy as Guidance

The Prophet ﷺ’s mercy is manifested through the guidance he provided, directing humanity towards the path of righteousness and away from moral and spiritual corruption. The Qur’an describes him as “an excellent example”¹⁹, whose actions and sayings serve as a practical model for ethical behavior. His teachings emphasized justice, compassion, and the importance of upholding moral values in all aspects of life. This guidance was not theoretical but was demonstrated through his own conduct, offering a tangible example for his followers to emulate.

3. Mercy as Justice

Mercy in the Qur’anic context is closely linked with justice. The Prophet ﷺ exemplified this by ensuring fairness and equity in his dealings with others. He established a society where the rights of individuals were protected, and justice was administered impartially. The Qur’an instructs believers to “stand firm in justice”²⁰, a principle that the Prophet ﷺ embodied in his leadership. His administration was characterized by a commitment to justice, even when it involved personal sacrifice or challenging the powerful.

4. Mercy as Forgiveness

One of the most profound expressions of the Prophet ﷺ’s mercy was his capacity for forgiveness. Despite facing persecution and hostility, he forgave those who wronged him, demonstrating that mercy surpasses retribution. The Qur’an encourages forgiveness, stating, “And let not those of virtue among you and wealth swear not to give to the near of kin and the needy and the emigrants for the cause of Allah”²¹ highlighting the importance of pardoning others and maintaining social harmony. The Prophet ﷺ’s life is replete with examples of forgiveness, setting a precedent for his followers to emulate.

5. Mercy as Compassion

Compassion is a central component of the Prophet ﷺ’s mercy. He exhibited deep empathy towards others, understanding their struggles and offering support. The Qur’an describes him as “compassionate and merciful”²², reflecting his profound sensitivity to the needs and suffering of others. His compassion extended to all beings, including animals and the environment, demonstrating that mercy encompasses all aspects of creation.

6. Mercy as a Means of Reconciliation

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy facilitated reconciliation among individuals and communities. By promoting understanding and tolerance, he bridged divides and healed rifts. The Qur'an advises, "And if two factions among the believers fall to fighting, then make peace between them",²³ illustrating the role of mercy in fostering unity and resolving conflicts. The Prophet ﷺ's efforts in reconciling warring tribes and factions are exemplary of this principle.

7. Mercy as a Source of Peace

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy was instrumental in establishing peace within society. His teachings advocated for peaceful coexistence, respect for others, and the resolution of disputes through dialogue and understanding. The Qur'an emphasizes the importance of peace, stating, "And if they incline to peace, then incline to it" (8:61), underscoring that mercy leads to tranquility and harmony. The Prophet ﷺ's efforts in promoting peace are evident in his treaties and agreements aimed at ensuring the welfare of all parties involved.

8. Mercy as a Transformative Force

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy had a transformative effect on individuals and society. It inspired personal growth, social reform, and the establishment of a just and compassionate community. The Qur'an speaks of the Prophet ﷺ as a means of spiritual purification, stating, "It is He who has sent among the unlettered a messenger from themselves, reciting to them His verses and purifying them, highlighting the role of mercy in personal and communal transformation.

9. Mercy as a Reflection of Divine Attributes

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy reflects the divine attribute of mercy (rahmah), as Allah is described as "the Most Merciful". By embodying mercy, the Prophet ﷺ served as a conduit for divine compassion, guiding humanity towards understanding and emulating the divine qualities. The Qur'an instructs believers to "follow the example of the Prophet",²⁴ indicating that his mercy is a reflection of the divine mercy that should be mirrored in human conduct.

10. Mercy as a Path to Salvation

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy is integral to the salvation of humanity. Through his teachings and intercession, believers are guided towards the path of righteousness and eternal success. The Qur'an states, "And We have not sent you except as a mercy to the worlds",²⁵ reiterating that his mercy is a means of achieving spiritual fulfillment and divine pleasure.

Prophetic Mercy in Hadith Literature

The mercy of the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ, while deeply rooted in the Qur'an, finds detailed elaboration and practical illustration in the Hadith literature. Hadith, the recorded sayings, actions, and approvals of the Prophet ﷺ, provides concrete examples of how divine mercy was operationalized in human life. Through his personal conduct, the Prophet ﷺ embodied *rahmah*, displaying kindness, patience, and forgiveness toward family, companions, adversaries, and even animals, thereby offering a comprehensive moral blueprint for humanity.

1. Mercy Toward Family and Companions

The Prophet ﷺ's mercy is first observed in his immediate social circle. Numerous Hadiths describe his gentle treatment of family members, demonstrating patience, care, and empathy. For example, Aisha, his wife, recounts that the Prophet ﷺ would engage with children playfully, showing affection without condescension: "He used to play with us as one of us, and would not disdain us."²⁶ Such interactions reflect

a model of interpersonal kindness that balances authority with compassion, illustrating that mercy is not merely a religious ideal but a lived ethic.

Among companions, the Prophet ﷺ consistently demonstrated equitable treatment, regardless of social status, ethnicity, or economic position. He emphasized humility and care in leadership, instructing: “The leader of a people is their servant”.²⁷ This guidance underscores the functional aspect of mercy in governance: leaders are to administer justice with empathy, placing the welfare of others above personal gain.

2. Mercy Toward Adversaries

The Prophet ﷺ’s mercy was particularly pronounced toward adversaries, exemplifying the Qur’anic command to repel evil with good.²⁸ Even those who had persecuted him and his followers were shown leniency after the conquest of Makkah. Historical accounts note that he proclaimed general amnesty, saying: “Go, for you are free.”²⁹ This act of forgiveness highlights the transformative power of mercy: by choosing compassion over retribution, the Prophet ﷺ fostered reconciliation, social cohesion, and long-term peace. Additionally, Hadith literature records his merciful stance during military campaigns. He forbade unnecessary harm to non-combatants, instructed humane treatment of prisoners, and prohibited mutilation and destruction of property. Such rules reflect a consistent ethical framework wherein mercy is integrated into all human interactions, including conflict.

3. Mercy Toward Animals

A remarkable aspect of the Prophet ﷺ’s compassion is evident in his treatment of animals. The Hadiths contain numerous examples where he admonished cruelty and encouraged humane treatment. He said: “Whoever is kind to the creatures of God, he is kind to himself.”³⁰ The Prophet ﷺ criticized those who overburdened animals and emphasized moderation in their use, reflecting an ethical vision in which mercy encompasses all sentient beings. This inclusivity demonstrates the universality of *rahmah* in practice, transcending human-centered ethical concerns.

4. Mercy as Ethical Instruction

Hadith literature also presents the Prophet ﷺ’s mercy as a principle for ethical behavior. He instructed his followers to embody kindness, patience, and forgiveness in daily life. For instance, he stated: “*The merciful are shown mercy by The Merciful. Be merciful to those on earth, and the One above the heavens will have mercy upon you.*”³¹ This teaching establishes reciprocity between divine and human mercy: ethical conduct inspired by compassion yields divine favor and fosters communal well-being.

The Prophet ﷺ’s mercy was not limited to interpersonal interactions; it extended to societal ethics. He promoted social justice, equitable economic practices, and ethical treatment of the marginalized. His guidance encouraged alleviating poverty, supporting orphans, and maintaining fairness in trade, demonstrating that mercy is inherently linked with justice and societal welfare.

5. Mercy as a Source of Spiritual Growth

Hadiths also emphasize mercy as a means of spiritual development. The Prophet ﷺ taught that compassionate behavior cultivates moral refinement, purifies the heart, and strengthens the bond between humans and God. For example, he said: “Allah does not show mercy to those who do not show mercy to people.” Such guidance underscores that mercy is both a spiritual obligation and a moral virtue, integrating the personal and social dimensions of ethical life.

In managing disputes, he prioritized reconciliation and restorative justice over punitive measures. He implemented equitable laws, ensured the rights of women and minorities, and modeled ethical leadership that prioritized the welfare of the community. These practices highlight the operational dimension of mercy, showing how divine ethics can be translated into practical policies that promote peace and social harmony.

7. Enduring Lessons from Prophetic Mercy

The Hadith literature collectively portrays the Prophet ﷺ as the living embodiment of Qur'anic mercy. His conduct provides timeless lessons: forgiveness over retaliation, compassion over cruelty, and service over domination. This holistic ethical model demonstrates that mercy is not a passive attribute but an active, dynamic principle guiding all human interactions. By studying these Hadiths, modern societies can draw valuable insights into conflict resolution, ethical leadership, and humanitarian ethics.

In conclusion, the Hadith literature complements the Qur'anic portrayal of the Prophet ﷺ as a mercy to the worlds. Through his actions and sayings, he operationalized divine mercy in every aspect of life—personal, social, and political. This practical model illustrates that mercy is both a moral imperative and a source of societal transformation. The Prophet ﷺ's life demonstrates that compassion, when consistently applied, can reconcile communities, nurture ethical societies, and inspire spiritual growth, reinforcing the universality and timeless relevance of his message.

The Universality of the Prophetic Mission

The mission of the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ is distinguished by its universal scope. Unlike previous prophets whose messages were primarily directed toward specific communities, the Qur'an emphasizes that Muhammad ﷺ was sent as a guide for all of humanity. Here, the Prophet ﷺ's role as a spiritual guide transcends particular social or cultural settings, addressing the universal need for moral and ethical direction.

5. Universality and Global Peace

The universality of the Prophet's ﷺ mission is intrinsically linked to his role as a source of global peace. His teachings advocate the resolution of disputes through dialogue, the protection of human rights, and the promotion of social justice. By extending mercy and ethical guidance to all of humanity, the Prophet ﷺ laid the foundation for peaceful coexistence, both within communities and among nations. The Qur'an emphasizes reconciliation and the avoidance of conflict, stating: "And if they incline to peace, then incline to it"³⁸. This principle demonstrates that the universal message of Islam, as embodied in the Prophet ﷺ, is inseparable from the pursuit of harmony and justice.

6. Cross-Cultural Relevance

The Prophet ﷺ's message remains relevant across cultures because its principles address universal human concerns. Issues such as oppression, inequality, and moral decay are addressed through the ethical framework he provided. His life exemplifies how these principles can be operationalized in diverse social, political, and economic environments, reinforcing the timeless and universal nature of his mission.

The Prophet ﷺ's universal mission is also evident in the transformative impact of his teachings. His emphasis on ethical conduct, social responsibility, and compassion resulted in the moral and social upliftment of communities in Arabia and beyond. This transformative quality illustrates that the universality of the message is not theoretical; it has practical implications for human development, social cohesion, and moral reform. By internalizing the Prophet's ﷺ principles, societies can achieve both ethical integrity and social harmony.

8. Continuity with Previous Prophets

The universality of the Prophet ﷺ's mission is further established through its continuity with previous revelations. The Qur'an situates Muhammad ﷺ within the prophetic tradition, portraying him as the final messenger whose teachings complete and universalize the moral guidance of earlier prophets (33:40). By

Both Qur'anic verses and Hadiths reinforce the idea that his message is relevant for all peoples, emphasizing mercy, justice, and ethical conduct as core principles. The universality of his mission demonstrates that the Prophet ﷺ is not merely a historical figure confined to Arabia, but a timeless guide whose teachings continue to inspire moral reform, social justice, and global peace.

Mercy as the Core of Islamic Ethics

Mercy (*rahmah*) is not merely a personal virtue in Islam; it is the cornerstone of the entire ethical framework that the Prophet Muhammad ﷺ established. The Qur'an consistently emphasizes that ethical conduct must be grounded in compassion, justice, and moral responsibility, reflecting the divine attribute of mercy. He advised leaders to prioritize the welfare of their subjects, administer justice impartially, and maintain humility. The ethical teachings of the Prophet ﷺ demonstrate that mercy is universally applicable. Regardless of cultural, geographic, or temporal context, the principles of compassion, justice, and forgiveness remain relevant. The Qur'an and Hadith provide an adaptable framework for moral behavior, ensuring that ethical
